During the third quarter we also saw training opportunities related to DHS and IT Security through Interface; both offered members the opportunity to expand their networks, as well as learn about recent events effecting critical infrastructure, and IT Security. We will continue the commitment to our membership to provide these types of training and learning opportunities in future meetings and training/networking opportunities.

As we close out the third quarter and begin the fourth, we must begin by announcing the call for future involvement in Chapter leadership. We will hold Chapter elections for 2019 in November 2018, and install new Chapter board members on January 1, 2019. We typically see few members step up for Chapter board roles, and fewer members participate in the voting process. We ask that this year you, our membership, take an invested stake in electing your representation
